At fifteen years old, Catrina Choate-Heretoiu moved to New York City to train at the School of American Ballet. After high school, she began working in the corps de ballet of Miami City Ballet, where she performed many Balanchine Ballets, as well as works by Paul Taylor. Ms. Heretoiu's performance career also includes working with Carolina Ballet and Miami Contemporary Dance Company. She holds a B.A. degree in English Literature from Florida International University and an MFA degree in Dance from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Ms. Heretoiu is a guild-certified Feldenkrais practitioner and has structured specific Awareness Through Movement lessons for dancers. She has taught ballet and modern dance to all levels, creative movement for children, and has facilitated expressive movement classes for incarcerated women. Champaign Urbana Ballet (CU Ballet) was formed in 1998 to promote classical and contemporary ballet, to offer training and performance opportunities to talented youth, and to enrich and involve the community through the art of dance. Under the artistic direction of founder Deanna Doty, the company has diversified its repertory and earned a reputation in the dance community as a superb training ground for pre-professional classical dancers. Through outreach programs, CU Ballet exposes children to the history and beauty of ballet. Champaign Urbana Ballet presents *The Nutcracker* each December with partners Sinfonia da Camera and Krannert Center for the Performing Arts and a full ballet each spring. The 2012-13 performance year marks the company's 15 season.
